It's normal for an estate to take **about a year or more** to fully administer. Don't feel pressure to rush - many steps take time and unfold gradually.

		Obtain a Death Certificate Usually handled by the funeral home. They will typically provide you with 10 <u>originals</u> of the Death Certificate (not a copy). Nothing can proceed without this document.
		Make Funeral or Cremation Arrangements If possible, follow the wishes of the deceased.
		Secure the Home & Valuables Ensure the home is secure, insured and any pets, mail, or valuables are taken care of.
		Notify Close Family and Friends This can be emotionally difficult - lean on support where possible.
K	The	re's No Rush – It's Ok to Wait on These Items
		Probate or Legal Steps You do <i>not</i> need to go to a lawyer or file for probate immediately. In most cases, you are afforded time to begin these processes.
		Bank Accounts and Bills You are not personally responsible for the deceased's debts. Financial institutions will not take action right away.
		Distributing Belongings Please wait before giving away or selling personal items. The Will (if one exists) may specify how they should be handled.
